

### Dear Friends,

The Chambon region of France is well known and respected for their work to take in Jewish families and children during WWII. They provided a safe haven for thousands of Jews, often at great risk to themselves. Had they been found out, the citizens would have faced severe punishment and possibly death. As a community, they made the decision to act faithfully and compassionately amid such dangers. Where possible, some of the Jews were smuggled into nearby Switzerland. Others remained living within the community, fed and cared for until the war was over.

Many books and documentaries have been made about their noble work. But I came upon an article in Smithsonian magazine a few years ago that was very interesting. When asked about the decision to shelter these refugees, at great peril to themselves, one citizen commented that this was who they were. As a community, such compassion was a part of their identity.


He pointed out that during the Reformation, residents sheltered Protestants fleeing persecution from the Catholic Church. During the World War II they provided shelter to Jews, sparing an estimated 3200 people from certain death. And in more modern times, they were welcoming refugees from the wars in the Middle East. The local resident said, "It's not a decision we reflect on. It's always been spontaneous. We just keep doing what we're doing."

I love the notion that compassion is a part of their communal identity. This is who we are. We are a people of love and kindness. And that reality impacts their actions, both as individuals and as a community. The decision to be kind and caring was made centuries prior, and they just keep doing those things.

Seldom do we put our actions to such scrutiny. Why do we feed our neighbors in need thorough Hot Meals? Why is it important for First UMC to have a preschool? Why do we serve funeral dinners to grieving families? We seldom pause to ask such questions because the decision was made long ago. This is who we are. We are a community of believers seeking to live out our faith in meaningful ways together. The ministries and activities may evolve over time and new opportunities emerge but underlying it all is a collective identity of kind and compassionate faith that is expressed in tangible ways through our service together.

Recent fundraising paid for the building and installation of an elevator in this six-story building, making the entire building handicap accessible. Monies are now being raised to pay for the newly installed boiler.

Located in downtown Indianapolis, LRR has been around since 1977. It houses up to 49 individuals, recovering from alcohol and drug addiction. LRR's 12-step recovery process and meetings help residents rebuild their lives and relationships with God. LRR offers a safe, clean and sober environment for residents and the opportunity to work on a "self-help" program.

Jeri Ahlbrand is a member of the Board of LRR. She is presently accepting donations of items for Raines Fest, an event where the residents enjoy food, fellowship, and games, where they can 'win' necessary items like shampoo, pillows, paper towels, dish cloths, non-fridge items, etc. Please see Jeri for a list of items needed. Items need to be brought to the October United Women in Faith meeting.




### **New Member Class**

### **Mission Donation Requests**

During the closing months of the year, there are many appeals for help, especially related to Christmas. The Missions Committee is aware of these needs and that different opportunities appeal to different givers. So, as we prepare for the upcoming requests, we want to make you aware of what is coming so that you can select the area(s) where you would like to contribute.

One of the historic giving opportunities has been a canned food drive for the Love Chapel Food Pantry. They will be doing things differently this year. Rather than asking churches to donate specific canned goods, they are asking for a direct donation for food baskets which will be distributed to those in need in our community. The estimated cost of each basket is \$80. So First UMC has agreed to provide funds for 25 baskets for a total of \$2000. This financial drive will run from mid-October to mid-November so that baskets can be distributed after Thanksgiving. If you would like to donate to this local ministry, please put "Love Chapel" in the memo line of your check.

The second opportunity will be gift cards for local ministries like Just Friends and Turning Point. The Learning Tree Preschool will be selling gift cards on Sunday November 17th, and you can purchase an Amazon gift card for one of these organizations to support their ongoing work in our community.

The third opportunity will come later in November and into December as we will have an angel tree with specific gift requests for families in need. With the help of the Lincoln Central Neighborhood Foundation we will be offering specific requests for holiday needs that you can purchase and bring to the church.

### September 9, 2024

- 22 women attended.
- Stephanie Taylor opened the meeting with a prayer and announced the front table had sign up sheets for all upcoming events.
- Minutes were approved as corrected.
- Treasurer reported \$1255 in pledges.
- Jeri Ahlbrand reported 9 women attended the TTL visit to the Lucille Raines home and distributed a list of items we need to donate for the Raines Fest event. A SE district member is needed for the Lucille Raines board for Jan. -June. Susan Gobert volunteered to do it.
- Prayer calendar was for Proverbs 8:3 -9:6 and Hebrews 11:29-12:2 which talks about the faith of Israelite heroes. The reflection compared making bread to our religious walk with God.
- Sheryl Nulph reported on the cost of the ingredients to make California Caviar Cheese spread.
   There was much discussion about the difficulty of preparing this recipe, storing the product and selling it as a fundraiser for the Lucille Raines Home. It was suggested doing a Dine and Donate event instead of making the spread.
- Georgianna motioned \$25 be taken from the Cheer Fund to repay Sheryl for making the sample cheese spread and doing the research. Susan Gobert seconded the motion.
- Sheryl distributed flyers about the CARS program and its next event.
- Jane Lyle presented flyers about the two line dancing classes at FUMC.
- Sheryl motioned to accept the new slate of officers with Susan French as secretary and Cathy Custer seconded. Vote approved.
- Stephanie announced donations and workers were needed for hosting the district meeting at FUMC on Oct. 23. Members were signed up.
- Anne Johnson started the worship based on Thessalonians 5:11. She had prepared a list of scriptures relating to encouragement. She began the program with the writings of Max Ehrmann and shared his thoughts about life with "Desiderata" and closed with the Serenity Prayer.
- Cynthia Stephenson reported that our unit's pledge to the district would be \$2000. Since we only have pledges of \$1255 at this date, we need to raise more funds. Maybe we should consider a fundraiser. There are also vacancies on the Executive board that need to be filled. Tabled this discussion for a later date in October.
- Cheer fund total was \$286 before paying \$20 for Proxy Parent and \$25 to Sheryl Nulph. The balance after this meeting is \$316.
- Susan Gobert showed us the FUMC quilt that was made by members many years ago. Since she had the quilt cleaned, she plans to display it on the wall of the main hallway.
